

For this week's bulletin, I thought I would share some poetry. Here are two poems by George Herbert (1593-1633), the first for Holy Saturday, and the second for Easter Sunday. Along with these poems, I found some commentaries to draw out their richness at <https://www.georgeherbert.org.uk/>. Enjoy, and may these Holy Days be a blessing and source of grace to you all!

'Sepulchre'

O blessed bodie! Whither art thou thrown?
No lodging for thee, but a cold, hard stone?
So many hearts on earth, and yet not one
Receive thee?
Sure there is room within our hearts good store;
For they can lodge transgressions by the score:
Thousands of toys dwell there, yet out of doore
They leave thee.

But that which shows them large, shows them unfit.
What ever sinne did this pure rock commit,
Which holds thee now? Who hath indited it
Of murder?
Where our hard hearts have took up stones to brain thee,
And missing this, most falsly did arraigne thee;
Onely these stones in quiet entertain thee,
And order.

And as of old, the Law by heav'nly art
Was writ in stone; so thou, which also art
The letter of the word, find'st no fit heart
To hold thee.

Yet do we still persist as we began,
And so should perish, but that nothing can,
Though it be cold, hard, foul, from loving man
Withhold thee.



The poem is austere in form, but rich in biblical associations. It is addressed first to the body of Jesus, placed in a cold, hard stone tomb, but also to Jesus as a living person who can enter into our hearts and lives.

The first stanza suggests that the body of Jesus is thrown into a cold hard stone tomb because our hearts are too full of other things to receive him. They are large enough ('good store') but filled up with 'thousands of toys' (trivialities) and 'transgressions' (breaking God's law). The idea that we have 'hearts of stone' comes from the Old Testament prophet Ezekiel (36.26).

By contrast, in the next stanza the stone of the tomb is innocent, unlike us whose hearts are full of transgressions. Continuing to play with the theme of stone in the Bible, Herbert refers to an incident in John's gospel (10.31) when Jesus' hearers, angry at what he had said, 'took up stones to stone him'.

Herbert goes on to compare 'our hard hearts' with those who rejected Jesus and wanted to kill him in this way. By way of contrast the stone tomb, in a quiet and orderly way, received him – 'entertain' in the sense of entertaining a visitor to a meal.

The third stanza refers to the book of Exodus (31.18) where Moses was given 'the two tablets of the covenant, tablets of stone'. Jesus is described as 'the letter of the word': the detailed spelling out, the explanation of God's word, God's message to humankind.

But Herbert ends the poem on a note of hope. Although 'we still persist' in a way that would lead to our destruction, nothing, however 'cold, hard, foul' it is, can stop Jesus from loving us. If we are moved to despair by the hardness of our own hearts, the assurance that Jesus loves us is our source of hope.

'Easter'

Rise heart; thy Lord is risen. Sing his praise
Without delays,
Who takes thee by the hand, that thou likewise
With him mayst rise:
That, as his death calcined thee to dust,
His life may make thee gold, and much more just.

Awake, my lute, and struggle for thy part
With all thy art.
The cross taught all wood to resound his name,
Who bore the same.
His stretched sinews taught all strings, what key
Is best to celebrate this most high day.

Consort both heart and lute, and twist a song
Pleasant and long:
Or since all music is but three parts vied
And multiplied;
O let thy blessed Spirit bear a part,
And make up our defects with his sweet art.

I got me flowers to straw thy way:
I got me boughs off many a tree:
But thou wast up by break of day,
And brought'st thy sweets along with thee.

The Sun arising in the East,
Though he give light, and th'East perfume;
If they should offer to contest
With thy arising, they presume.

Can there be any day but this,
Though many suns to shine endeavour?
We count three hundred, but we miss:
There is but one, and that one ever.

The poet draws on Scripture to illustrate the poem: the words of praise from Psalm 57:8-10 and the theme of Paul's letter to the Romans, with its exploration of how people are made right with God - justified - through Jesus' death on the cross.

Christ, stretched out in death on the wood of the cross, becomes God's instrument, playing a melody of love to the world. The heart responds to the melody by joining with it, as instrumentalists join together in consort to make music. But since none can sing this tune perfectly, a further strand needs to be woven: that of the Spirit who makes up 'our defects with his sweet art'.

In the following song of joyful celebration, the poet sees the day of Christ's resurrection as unsurpassed in glory. 'Can there be any day but this' - the sun that rises each day of the year cannot shine as brightly as the Son of God as he brings light to the world.

Live-streaming Changes Reminder

For two years of the pandemic we have really worked to ensure that our parishioners have been able to still feel connected to the rest of the community when it comes to livestreaming our Masses. Over this time, we have at least streamed our Sunday Mass once a week, and when we were totally locked down, even were streaming daily. For nearly a year now, we have been streaming our Tuesday and Wednesday weekday Masses as well as two Sunday Masses, the Saturday 4 pm and the Sunday 11 am. Even with more recent changes, such as the lifting of dispensation for the Sunday obligation, we are committed to continue streaming for those who are especially home-bound and shut-in for various reasons.

However, with more activity and things happening in the parish, it has become increasingly more difficult to keep up with our current schedule. Last Sunday was the last 11 am Mass that was livestreamed. For Easter Sunday, we will livestream the 9 am Mass, due to Easter scheduling. After Easter, there **will no longer be livestreaming of our weekday Masses or our Sunday 11 am Mass.**

The vast majority of our views come from the Saturday 4 pm Mass, the first of our Sunday Masses, so this is the Mass that we will continue to livestream and record as usual. We predict that people probably appreciate watching that specific recording at a later time that works best for them, like later Saturday evening or early Sunday morning. Thank you for your continued support and understanding. We are all praying for and with each other.

Thank you, dear parishioners, for your wonderful response to our request for food and volunteers in support of Agape Table! On April 5, we delivered enough granola bars, juice boxes, pudding cups and fruit cups to feed about 500 people, as well as 5 pails of sandwich spread, enough to make about 400 sandwiches. Then, on April 6, five parishioners worked at Agape Table from 7:00 – 9:30 am, making about 900 sandwiches, chopping vegetables for soups and chile, and breaking down the shrink-wrapped boxes of food and sorting them. The staff at Agape Table (agapetable.ca) asked us to pass on their thanks to all of you on behalf of all those who otherwise would have been hungry that day. The parishioners who worked at Agape Table last Wednesday reported that they had a wonderful experience and enjoyed working with like-minded volunteers caring for our brothers and sisters in Winnipeg. With your help we hope to repeat this in October. God bless you all.

As part of our parish's participation in the work of Truth and Reconciliation, our Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) and Fr. Brian Trueman are inviting you, in partnership with Development and Peace – Caritas Canada, to the KAIROS Blanket Exercise, to learn more about the history of colonisation of Indigenous peoples in Canada and the role of the Church and government, and the resilience of the Indigenous peoples of Turtle Island. Led by an Indigenous elder, this simulation will allow non-indigenous participants to put themselves in the place of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples and the consequences that these peoples have suffered due to colonisation. The goal of this exercise is to allow participants to learn and to develop a deeper engagement in Reconciliation.

Bishop LeGatt Video Message


A Reflection on Pope Francis's Apology to Indigenous People

This week, Archbishop Albert LeGatt reflects and shares on the deeply moving experience he had, last week, as a witness to the meeting between Indigenous Peoples living in Canada and Pope Francis in Rome. During this historic meeting, Pope Francis expressed a heartfelt and sincere apology for the part the Church played in colonization, and the legacy of residential schools in Turtle Island. "I also feel shame. I have said this to you and now I say it again. I feel shame – sorrow and shame – for the role that a number of Catholics, particularly those with educational responsibilities, have had in all these things that wounded you, in the abuses you suffered and in the lack of respect shown for your identity, your culture and even your spiritual values. All these things are contrary to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. For the deplorable conduct of those members of the Catholic Church, I ask for God's forgiveness and I want to say to you with all my heart: I am very sorry. And I join my brothers, the Canadian bishops, in asking your pardon. Clearly, the content of the faith cannot be transmitted in a way contrary to the faith itself: Jesus taught us to welcome, love, serve and not judge; it is a frightening thing when, precisely in the name of the faith, counter-witness is rendered to the Gospel." -Pope Francis, April 1, 2022 Address to representatives of Indigenous Peoples in Canada

Listening to Indigenous Voices Discussion Groups



Listening to Indigenous Voices is a resource that has been published by the **Jesuit Forum for Social Faith and Justice** that "...explores Indigenous worldviews, examines the history of colonization, and concludes with sessions on righting relationships, decolonization, and indigenization. Each session includes questions to guide sharing circles as well as curriculum ideas for use in secondary and post-secondary educational settings." Using this book as a guide, small groups of 5 to 8 participants led by lay-people would meet over Zoom for approximately 1 hour every two weeks for 11 sessions to discuss the content of this resource. The cost of this program would be the cost of the books (maximum \$26).

There will be a group starting on April 26, 2022, meeting every other Tuesday via Zoom, facilitated by Diane L'Arrivee (a member of Holy Cross Parish and our Parish Accountant at St. Tim's). 


