



Easter First Readings

At Sunday Mass the first reading usually comes from the Old Testament. This custom changes, however, during the Easter season. For seven weeks from Easter Sunday until Pentecost, the first readings all come from the same book: the Acts of the Apostles. Thus the three readings at Sunday Mass and the two readings at daily Mass all come from the New Testament throughout the Easter season.

Easter makes everything new. The resurrection so changes human history that we immerse ourselves in the New Testament to seek more deeply the meaning of this mystery.

The Acts of the Apostles tells of the beginnings of the church. It opens with the ascension and Pentecost, recounts the spread of the faith in peace and persecution, and concludes with the missionary activity of Paul. This book bridges the gospels with the rest of church history. The Gospels culminate in the resurrection of Jesus, which inspired evangelization. Each Easter our church announces the resurrection through the Scriptures and increases its membership through baptism. We witness evangelization today as we recall its origins in the Acts of the Apostles.

The Old Testament is not completely absent. The Liturgy of the Word throughout the season still includes a responsorial psalm. The Mass for the Pentecost Vigil includes a reading from the Old Testament, foreshadowing the gift of the Spirit.

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Dear family,

This coming week, May 2nd-6th, the priests of the Archdiocese of St. Boniface will be having their annual retreat. This will be my third time attending our annually organised retreat; the first was as a seminarian intern; the second was as a priest via Zoom due to the pandemic; and now, returning to Pinawa for our normal in-person retreat. Despite my relative inexperience with the retreat however, I've been placed on the team for organising it which has a lot of new members as members who have organized it for many years pass on the torch. This year's Retreat Master is Sr. Jacqueline St-Ives, SGM (Sisters of Charity of Montreal) and the theme is "Your Word is a Lamp to my Feet and a Light to my Path".

The annual retreat for the diocesan priests comes from Canon Law, canon 276, specifically subsection 4:

Can. 276 §1. In leading their lives, clerics are bound in a special way to pursue holiness since, having been consecrated to God by a new title in the reception of orders, they are dispensers of the mysteries of God in the service of His people.

§2. In order to be able to pursue this perfection:

1/ they are first of all to fulfill faithfully and tirelessly the duties of the pastoral ministry;

2/ they are to nourish their spiritual life from the two-fold table of sacred scripture and the Eucharist; therefore, priests are earnestly invited to offer the eucharistic sacrifice daily and deacons to participate in its offering daily;

3/ priests and deacons aspiring to the presbyterate are obliged to carry out the liturgy of the hours daily according to the proper and approved liturgical books; permanent deacons, however, are to carry out the same to the extent defined by the conference of bishops;

4/ they are equally bound to make time for spiritual retreats according to the prescripts of particular law;

5/ they are urged to engage in mental prayer regularly, to approach the sacrament of penance frequently, to honor the Virgin Mother of God with particular veneration, and to use other common and particular means of sanctification.

Whenever Canon Law refers to particular law, as opposed to universal law, it typically means diocesan policy. So for our diocese, St. Boniface, they organize and plan for an annual retreat for the priests to fulfill this mandate. Whenever Canon Law is involved, though, rather than just reducing everything down to laws and rejecting disciplines, it is important to always remember the goal of all of the laws of the Church: "the salvation of souls, which must always be the supreme law in the Church, is to be kept before one's eyes." This is the concluding canon in the Code of Canon Law, #1752. But even in canon 276, we see that clerics (bishops, priests, and deacons) are bound to pursue holiness, and so the requirement for regular retreat is ordered to that pursuit. This is good to keep in mind especially in our modern context which seems to have such a negative view of mandates and precepts at face value; laws, mandates, and precepts should be ordered to serve the higher goods, in this case holiness in the life of the priest so as to be conducive to the salvation of souls.

With this all in mind, what ways do we all as baptised Christians pursue holiness? Is the supreme law in my life the salvation of souls? Do I understand the divine laws of God, like keeping the Lord's Day holy, and the Church precept of attending Sunday Mass in light of what is truly good for myself and others? What priority do I place in my life for other practices that help me progress in my call to holiness and sanctity?

I shall pray for you all during my retreat. Please pray for us!


