



Holy Week This Year

Dear Family,

As I was looking back at previous bulletins from last year around this time I found that I had written a message about what the liturgies of Holy Week would look like, given the pandemic situation at the time. Some adaptations had to be made, especially around physical distancing and contact, and attendance was limited to only 100 people then. This year, we find ourselves in a bit of a different situation, though still not completely normal. The Liturgy Committee and myself have reviewed our Holy Week liturgies from last year, looked at our current situation, and planned accordingly. My hope is to convey what these will look like for this year.

Palm Sunday- Last year, there was no solemn procession. Palms were blessed prior to Mass and placed on chairs to exclude nearly all contact. This year, we will be handing out palms to people as they arrive. People can take their palms to their seats inside. The priest and a small group of ministers will begin the liturgy with the blessing of palms from the narthex, and then the priest will continue to bless the rest of the palms held by the faithful with holy water. The Gospel passage will be read from the narthex recounting the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. The ministers and priest will then process into the church, while all sing “Hosanna”.

Holy Thursday- The washing of the feet option has been omitted for two years, but will return again this year. Last year, I spoke of a unique rubric for the Mass of the Lord’s Supper, which mentions that gifts for the poor may be brought forward during the Offertory. We wished to highlight this option, especially given our parish’s SSVP ministry. If you are coming, consider bringing a small food item or monetary donation for this. Along with this procession, we shall also receive the Holy Oils for our parish that have been blessed at the Chrism Mass prior. Last year, the reposition of the Blessed Sacrament for adoration after Mass took place at the back of the sanctuary. This year, a small procession of ministers will take place to the chapel of repose which will be set up in our parish hall. After the procession has taken place, the faithful are invited to spend some time there in prayer with our Lord, to “watch and pray”.


Good Friday- Last year’s Way of the Cross was done in multiple small groups. This year it will take place once in the morning for all who wish to participate. The liturgies at noon and three will include the possibility for individuals to venerate the cross via the traditional procession. Last year, only the priest did this and displayed the cross for all to venerate it from their seats to limit movement and contact.

Easter Vigil- Last year, only the priest and a few ministers gathered outside for the blessing of the fire and new paschal candle, and then processed into the church where the congregation was waiting. This year, people have the option to choose to be part of that procession at the beginning or may simply remain in their seats. We do not have a baptism this year, but a few ministers and myself will bless the water in the font. After our renewal of baptismal promises, I shall sprinkle the congregation with that newly blessed water.

I hope that these small highlights and comparisons help you get a sense of what to anticipate so that you can be more disposed to entering more fully into the greatest liturgical celebrations of our year and faith. Last year was my first experience of Holy Week as a priest, and I am eagerly looking forward to my second with you all.

May this Holy Week be a source of spiritual renewal for all of us. God bless you.



ADORATION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT HOLY THURSDAY AFTER MASS until MIDNIGHT

At the conclusion of the Mass, the faithful are invited to continue Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament until midnight, just as the disciples were invited to stay up with the Lord during His agony in the garden before His betrayal by Judas.

Stay after Mass for a time or return later to pray.

We encourage you to come with your family and friends, or invite your parish groups or ministries to stay and pray with you.



Good Friday Outdoor Carrying of the Cross - 10:30 am

As in past years, we have many parishioners take part in the walk that follows a pre-determined route in our neighbourhood. **We encourage everyone -- the young and the young-at-heart -- to walk with us and carry the cross as we remember Jesus as he carried his cross to his crucifixion.**

Make Good Friday a physical experience as much as a spiritual one by taking part in the walk. It's like praying on your feet!

Blessing of Easter Food Holy Saturday, April 16 at 1:30 pm at the church



If you haven't taken part in this special tradition yet, make a point to do so this year! It's easy to put together your own traditional Easter Basket for blessing. Children are excited to participate in this heart-warming tradition by helping to prepare and decorate the family basket and bring it to church for the blessing. They can even carry their very own decorated basket filled with eggs, a chocolate bunny or some other treat to be blessed.

Then the blessed food is eaten on Easter and the days following.

Some examples of the food brought for blessing and their meaning:

Kielbasa or ham: Indicates God's favour and generosity.

Horseradish: Symbolize the bitter herbs of the Passover and the Exodus.

Eggs: Coloured boiled eggs symbolize life and rebirth, and especially Christ's Resurrection from the Tomb.

Bread or Paska: Symbolizes Christ, "the Bread of Life".

Salt: "You are the salt of the earth."

Vinegar: Symbolizes the gall given to Christ at the crucifixion.

Wine: Symbolizes the blood of Christ.

Live-streaming Changes

For two years of the pandemic we have really worked to ensure that our parishioners have been able to still feel connected to the rest of the community when it comes to livestreaming our Masses. Over this time, we have at least streamed our Sunday Mass once a week, and when we were totally locked down, even were streaming daily. For nearly a year now, we have been streaming our Tuesday and Wednesday weekday Masses as well as two Sunday Masses, the Saturday 4 pm and the Sunday 11 am. Even with more recent changes, such as the lifting of dispensation for the Sunday obligation, we are committed to continue streaming for those who are especially home-bound and shut-in for various reasons.

However, with more activity and things happening in the parish, it has become increasingly more difficult to keep up with our current schedule. This Sunday will be the last 11 am Mass that is livestreamed. For Easter Sunday, we will livestream the 9 am Mass, due to Easter scheduling. After Easter, there **will no longer be livestreaming of our weekday Masses or our Sunday 11 am Mass.**

The vast majority of our views come from the Saturday 4 pm Mass, the first of our Sunday Masses, so this is the Mass that we will continue to livestream and record as usual. We predict that people probably appreciate watching that specific recording at a later time that works best for them, like later Saturday evening or early Sunday morning. Thank you for your continued support and understanding. We are all praying for and with each other.

That is the last step before being handed tickets for the "New World".

At this time of horrific conflict in Eastern Europe, we are reminded once again of how lucky we are to be Canadians. As much as we would like to sponsor Ukrainian families, we have a responsibility to the ones we have already requested. We now have the opportunity to bring one more family (and a husband/wife pending) to Winnipeg. We have been in touch already through Facebook and they are SO VERY anxious to meet you all so they can thank you for the gift of sponsorship in person. **However, we are still short approximately \$25,000.** So we are making an appeal to you to help bring them "home".


Pontifical Collection for the Holy Land on Good Friday

As part of our parish's participation in the work of Truth and Reconciliation, our Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) and Fr. Brian Trueman are inviting you, in partnership with Development and Peace – Caritas Canada, to the KAIROS Blanket Exercise, to learn more about the history of colonisation of Indigenous peoples in Canada and the role of the Church and government, and the resilience of the Indigenous peoples of Turtle Island. Led by an Indigenous elder, this simulation will allow non-indigenous participants to put themselves in the place of First Nations, Inuit and Métis peoples and the consequences that these peoples have suffered due to colonisation. The goal of this exercise is to allow participants to learn and to develop a deeper engagement in Reconciliation.


A Reflection on Pope Francis's Apology to Indigenous People

This week, Archbishop Albert LeGatt reflects and shares on the deeply moving experience he had, last week, as a witness to the meeting between Indigenous Peoples living in Canada and Pope Francis in Rome. During this historic meeting, Pope Francis expressed a heartfelt and sincere apology for the part the Church played in colonization, and the legacy of residential schools in Turtle Island. "I also feel shame. I have said this to you and now I say it again. I feel shame – sorrow and shame – for the role that a number of Catholics, particularly those with educational responsibilities, have had in all these things that wounded you, in the abuses you suffered and in the lack of respect shown for your identity, your culture and even your spiritual values. All these things are contrary to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. For the deplorable conduct of those members of the Catholic Church, I ask for God's forgiveness and I want to say to you with all my heart: I am very sorry. And I join my brothers, the Canadian bishops, in asking your pardon. Clearly, the content of the faith cannot be transmitted in a way contrary to the faith itself: Jesus taught us to welcome, love, serve and not judge; it is a frightening thing when, precisely in the name of the faith, counter-witness is rendered to the Gospel." -Pope Francis, April 1, 2022 Address to representatives of Indigenous Peoples in Canada

Listening to Indigenous Voices Discussion Groups



Listening to Indigenous Voices is a resource that has been published by the **Jesuit Forum for Social Faith and Justice** that "...explores Indigenous worldviews, examines the history of colonization, and concludes with sessions on righting relationships, decolonization, and indigenization. Each session includes questions to guide sharing circles as well as curriculum ideas for use in secondary and post-secondary educational settings." (https://jesuitforum.ca/dialogue_guides/listening-to-indigenous-voices/)

Using this book as a guide, small groups of 5 to 8 participants led by lay-people would meet over Zoom for approximately 1 hour every two weeks for 11 sessions to discuss the content of this resource. The cost of this program would be the cost of the books (maximum \$26).

There will be a group starting on April 26, 2022, meeting every other Tuesday via Zoom, facilitated by Diane L'Arrivee (a member of Holy Cross Parish and our Parish Accountant at St. Tim's). 


